Tony Bracamonte was born in Douglas, Arizona. While living in a border town, Tony was able to see and experience some multicultural backgrounds. Later in his life, Tony went to Cochise College and shortly after attended the University of Arizona. He later then gained experience with working with children through social work. Tony became a Kellogg National Fellow and did some research, mainly focused on Mexico and U.S. affiliations. Most of Tony's work comes from doing things hands on. He explains that through his experiences in South Phoenix, that the biggest change you will notice is the development. Tony discusses how development in South Phoenix has been able to draw in more people and help build our economy. Tony appreciates the volunteers throughout our community. He explains that the most important people are the one's who work towards community issues. I believe Tony is an important piece to the story in our project. I say this because he has not only been a part of South Mountain Community College, but also the South Phoenix community. When he first came to South Mountain CC, he was hired to develop the testing and learning center. He was able to help are faculty by advancing them to know more than one general area. For example, instead of one person only knowing about advisement, they may also know information about financial aid. Later on in his career at South Mountain he became involved with being an associate Dean and also the BNFP. The BNFP (Bilingual Nursing Fellowship Program) was made to help students prepare to be nurses at hospitals. It was also made to help hospitals find more Spanish speaking nurses. Hospitals were originally spending lots of money to fly

in nurses from the Philippians. The BNFP was very successful, but also had many struggles. In the early processes of this program they had difficulties thinking about how students would become interested and motivated to be in this program. Despite those issues, they had many students come. They even had students who had earlier dropped out of school and then chose to come back. Something important that Tony mentions is that although education is important, it is not the title that means something. What Tony means by this is that, the title of your degree does not define you. The things that define you is what you have accomplished in your life. He mentions that although he worked in the education department, he never believed that the degree one may have pursued was never as important as the motivation and hard work it took to obtain that degree. I think this is something important to remember in life. Later in his life Tony became a community activist. This activism was sparked by where he was from, Douglas. I think living in a border town helped Tony to see some of the experiences that immigrants face. Through this activism Tony was able to visit border facilities in El Paso and see some of the horrible circumstances' asylum-seeking immigrants were facing. I believe Tony is of great significance to our project because he seen a lot of growth from our community and also SMCC.
